- UK Study Visa Surge: UK emerging as a favored destination for Indian students, supported by streamlined visa procedures and new graduate visa routes.
- US Enrollment Growth: Significant surge in Indian student enrollment in the US, highlighting strategic recruitment efforts and growing attractiveness.
- Australia's Post-Pandemic Recovery:
 Resurgence in the international education sector driven by Indian student numbers and economic cooperation agreements.

- Student Aspirations and Global Education: International students seek welcoming environments and career opportunities, emphasizing the importance of educational quality and policy alignment.

Student Mobility: Exploring International Education Migration Trends


In 2024, Australia, Canada, the UK, and the USA are expected to see a slowdown in new international student enrollments despite a strong post-pandemic rebound. UK study visa growth has stagnated since recovering to pre-pandemic levels by Q3 2021. In contrast, the US saw a 14% increase in new enrollments for 2022/23, totaling 298,523 students. Canada remains attractive with an estimated 364,000 out of 606,000 applications projected to be approved. Despite some moderation in growth, South Asia, the USA, and Canada continue to be highly appealing to international students.

Transforming South Asian Education

Trends in Outbound Student Mobility from India

By 2023, around 850,000 Indian students had enrolled in top four choices, the USA, Canada, the UK, and Australia. This number exceeded 1 million in 2019 and is forecasted to reach between 1.5 and 2 million by 2025.

Rapid Growth in Bangladeshi Student Mobility

The data from 2020 and 2022 highlights the growing interest among Bangladeshi students in international higher education opportunities, the figures being from 49,150 to over 70,000 respectively.


Exploring the Surge in Nepalese Student Mobility

Canada-India Visa Processing Disruptions Impact Indian Students


The visa processing system for Indian students has been significantly impacted by the ongoing diplomatic tensions between India and Canada with the immigration staff decreased from 27 to 5.

Minister Miller has acknowledged that Canada will not be able to achieve its goal of processing 38,000 visas for Indian applicants by December 2023 due to limited resources and staffing constraints. It is anticipated that only 20,000 visas will be processed, resulting in a backlog of around 17,500 visa applications by January 2024.

Meanwhile, India continues to dominate Canada's international student market, accounting for nearly 40% of all foreign enrolments with close to 320,000 Indian students holding study permits by the end of 2022—a growth of 46% since 2019.

United Kingdom: Indian Students Propel Study Visa Surge

Approximately 500,000 study visas were issued during this period, and 30% of them were given to Indian students. The streamlined visa process has made it easier for Indian students to pursue their education in the UK.


Major Growth in Indian Student Enrollment


Indian student visas in the US have seen a growth of more than 30% since 2020, indicating a rising trend in Indian student interest in American institutions, almost on par with the number of Chinese students.

Australia:

Indian Students Drive Post-Pandemic Education Recovery


Similarly, Australia is experiencing a resurgence in its international education sector, driven by a 34% increase in Indian student numbers in January-August 2023. The recently signed Australia-India Economic Cooperation and Trade Agreement (ECTA) aims to further facilitate student mobility between the two countries, allowing Indian graduates to work in Australia for up to four years. Despite the challenges faced, India is projected to maintain its role as a prominent source market for international students, with student enrollment expected to reach 2 million by 2025.

Exploring Student Mobility Trends and Updates: Nepal's Role in International Education

Taxation Strain on Nepali Families:

Nepali families sending their children abroad for education now face additional financial burdens due to a new 3% tax on payments to foreign colleges, translating to nearly USD 1,000 on a USD 30,000 tuition fee. This tax hike is seen by some as part of a strategy to discourage students from pursuing education outside Nepal.

Financial Outflow and Educational Expenditure:


Nepal Rastra Bank data shows students remitted approximately USD 571 million for tuition in the fiscal year 2022-23, raising concerns for the government. With over 125,000 Nepali students studying abroad in 2022, destinations like Australia, Japan, India, and the USA remain popular. Rajendra Baral of the Educational Consultancy Association of Nepal emphasizes creating a supportive environment to encourage students to return home.

Challenges in Nepal's Education System:

The domestic education system's issues, such as underfunding and lack of qualified teachers, drive families to consider study abroad essential. The 3% tax is also causing concern among foreign educators, especially amidst inflation.

Navigating Bureaucratic Hurdles and Career Challenges:

Enticing students to return to Nepal post-study is challenging due to youth unemployment and bureaucratic hurdles. Aastha Dahal, a PhD holder from the University of Cambridge, highlights the difficulties in obtaining necessary certificates and finding suitable opportunities in Nepal, reflecting broader issues with educational policies and economic dynamics.

Exploring Student Mobility Trends: Insights and Updates from Bangladesh

Bangladeshi students face a range of opportunities and challenges in their pursuit of higher education abroad within a dynamic educational environment.

Despite the appealing scholarships and facilities available in countries like the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom, Australia, Germany, and Japan, numerous Bangladeshi students are unable to benefit from these opportunities due to eligibility limitations.

Recent UNESCO data reveals that in 2023, a total of 52,799 Bangladeshi students pursued studies abroad. The breakdown of destinations is as follows:

· United States: **8,524** students

• United Kingdom: **6,586** students

· Canada: **5,835** students

• Malaysia: **5,714** students

· Germany: **5,046** students

· Australia: **4,987** students

· Japan: 2,082 students


· India: 2,606 students

· South Korea: 1,202 students

· Saudi Arabia: 1,190 students

Comparatively, Bangladeshi student numbers abroad show a gradual increase, but they remain lower than students from neighbouring countries like India, Nepal, and Pakistan.

Insights from Experts and Officials:

- Professor Abdul Mannan: Stressed the need to enhance educational quality in Bangladesh to meet international standards.
- Retired Professor Siddiqur Rahman: Emphasized the critical role of language skills and quality education for global competition and highlighted the need for research to address lagging performance.
- Kazi Faridul Hoque (FACD-CAB President):
 Underscored language competence as a major barrier to student mobility and highlighted the demand for quality English-medium schools and private universities.
- Deputy Minister for Education, Mohibul Hassan Chowdhury: Highlighted government efforts to establish universities providing quality education and support for students pursuing higher education abroad.

Barriers and Opportunities:

- Challenges: Inadequate language skills, financial constraints, lack of information, taxation documentation requirements, accommodation issues, employment restrictions, and immigration policies.
- Opportunities: Improvements in language education and increasing access to quality institutions in Bangladesh are gradually enhancing prospects for Bangladeshi students to compete globally and pursue higher education abroad.
- This overview highlights the importance of addressing key challenges while leveraging opportunities to empower Bangladeshi students in their pursuit of global education.

Top Destinations for Sri Lankan Students

Leading Countries:

United Kingdom: In 2024, approximately 8,500 Sri Lankan students chose the UK as their study destination, marking a 10% increase from 2023. The UK remains the top choice due to its prestigious universities and post-study work opportunities.

Australia: Australia attracted 7,200 Sri Lankan students in 2024, a slight decrease from the previous year due to stricter visa regulations but still a leading destination due to its favourable climate and high living standards. Canada: Canada saw a significant rise, with 6,000 Sri Lankan students enrolling in 2024, a 15% increase, driven by its welcoming immigration policies and strong emphasis on multiculturalism.

India: India remains a popular destination, especially for medical and engineering students, with around 5,000 Sri Lankan students enrolled in 2024, a 5% increase from 2023.

New and Emerging Destinations:

Germany: Germany emerged as a new favourite, with 1,200 students in 2024, up 20% from the previous year, thanks to low tuition fees and strong engineering programs.

Southern Province: The Southern Province contributed 3,500 students, reflecting a growing interest in foreign education.

Urban vs. Rural Trends:

Urban centers like Colombo had a higher concentration of outbound students, with a student mobility rate of 55% compared to 30% in rural areas. This disparity is attributed to better access to information and preparatory resources in urban areas.

Influence of Local Educational Institutions:

Prestigious schools in Colombo, such as Royal College and Visakha Vidyalaya, were key contributors, with graduates making up nearly 20% of the total student migration numbers.



City Dynamics and Student Demand

Popular Cities for Higher Education:

Colombo: Colombo alone accounted for 10,000 students studying abroad, with a significant concentration in the fields of business and engineering.

Kandy: Kandy contributed to 3,200 students, primarily in medicine and allied health sciences, due to the strong presence of preparatory institutions in the city.

Galle: Galle saw 2,800 students, with a growing interest in environmental and marine sciences.

Local Demand for Foreign Education:

The demand for foreign education in Colombo grew by 12% in 2024, driven by the increasing availability of educational consultancy services and international school networks.

Infrastructure and Resources:

Colombo hosted over 50 educational consultancy firms and international schools, making it the most well-equipped city to support outbound student mobility.





Top Destinations for Bhutanese Students

Leading Countries:

India: India remains the most popular destination, with around 6,000 Bhutanese students enrolled in 2024, largely due to the geographical proximity and cultural similarities. Popular fields include Engineering, Medicine, and Business.

Australia: Australia attracted approximately 2,500 Bhutanese students in 2024, a 12% increase from 2023, driven by strong post-study work opportunities and high-quality education.

Thailand: Thailand saw a growing number of Bhutanese students, with about 1,200 students in 2024, up 8% from the previous year, particularly in hospitality and management studies.

New and Emerging Destinations:

United Kingdom: The UK attracted 900 students in 2024, a slight increase, fueled by scholarships and competitive academic programs in the humanities and social sciences

Malaysia: Malaysia emerged as a viable option for Bhutanese students, with 700 enrollments in 2024, particularly for affordable programs in IT and Business.

Medicine: India and Thailand are the top choices for Bhutanese medical students, accounting for nearly 3,000 students in 2024.

Hospitality and Tourism: Thailand and Switzerland remain attractive for hospitality and tourism studies, with around 1,500 students opting for these fields.

Regional Distribution of Outbound Students:

Thimphu: Thimphu, Bhutan's capital, leads in outbound student numbers with approximately 5,000 students studying abroad in 2024, reflecting its status as the educational hub of the country.

Paro: Paro contributed about 2,000 students, driven by a strong interest in international studies in business and management.

Eastern Bhutan: The eastern regions, such as Trashigang, saw a smaller but growing number of outbound students, with 1,200 students in 2024, reflecting increased access to information and educational opportunities.

Urban vs. Rural Trends:

Urban areas like Thimphu and Paro showed higher student mobility rates (about 70%) than rural regions, where only 30% of students pursued education abroad. This discrepancy is attributed to better access to preparatory resources in urban centres.

Influence of Local Educational Institutions:

Prominent institutions like Royal Thimphu College played a significant role in preparing students for international education, with their graduates representing 25% of Bhutanese students studying abroad in 2024.

Popular Cities for Higher Education:

Thimphu: Thimphu accounted for the highest number of outbound students, with around 4,000 students in 2024, primarily in business, engineering, and IT.

Paro: Paro, with its growing educational infrastructure, saw about 1,500 students pursuing higher education abroad, particularly in the management and hospitality fields.





In recent years, Pakistani students have increasingly pursued international higher education, significantly boosting outbound mobility. UNESCO data shows that the number of Pakistani students studying abroad rose from 64,065 in 2020 to over 103, 190 by 2022, according to government sources.

Top Destinations for Pakistani Students:

- United Arab Emirates (UAE): In 2020, UNESCO reported 24,865 Pakistani students in the UAE.
- United Kingdom (UK): A substantial increase was noted in the UK, with 23,075 Pakistani students in 2021/22, marking a remarkable 62% year-on-year growth.
- Australia: Australian universities welcomed 15,875 Pakistani students in 2022, reflecting a 15% increase.
- United States (US): The US recorded 8,770
 Pakistani students in 2021/22, marking a 17% growth.
- Germany: German universities attracted 7,115
 Pakistani students in 2021/22, showing a 22% increase.
- Canada: The number of Pakistani students in Canada reached 6,405 in 2022, showing a significant 38% rise.

Regional Insights:

- Punjab Region: Punjab, Pakistan's most populous region, significantly contributes to international student mobility, particularly to the UK. Major cities like Lahore, Faisalabad, Gujrat, and Sargodha drive this demand due to strong family connections and business ties in the UK.
- North Region (Islamabad and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa): Students from this region often prefer North America and Australia over the UK for higher education.
- South Region (Karachi and Surrounding Areas): Karachi focuses on the US as a study destination, benefiting from the presence of US universities and strong local engagement.

City Dynamics and Student Demand:


- Metropolitan cities like Karachi, Lahore, and Islamabad are key contributors to outbound student numbers due to their large populations and awareness of international opportunities.
- Cities like Faisalabad and Peshawar are emerging as significant hubs for study abroad, reflecting rapid growth in demand.

Scholarships and Push Factors:

- Scholarships significantly impact Pakistani students' choices of destinations and courses.
- Population dynamics and evolving preferences are continuously shaping the global higher education landscape, fostering greater academic and cultural exchanges.

Facilitating Global Education: Agent Insights on Student Mobility from South Asia

Emerging Futures Research Program Insights:

In March 2024, IDP Education surveyed international students from 117 countries, revealing a significant shift in preferences.

1. US Surpasses Australia and UK:

The US is now the top choice for international students, gaining five percentage points since last year. Australia has fallen from its top spot, losing two percentage points since August 2023, and Canada dropped to fourth place due to new policies.

2. Impact of Government Policies:

54% of prospective and applied students are aware of recent policy changes, and 41% are reconsidering their plans due to these policies.

3. Policy Clarity and Competitiveness:

Simon Emmett, CEO of IDP Connect, emphasizes the need for government clarity on international student policies to maintain competitiveness. The UK, Australia, and Canada are urged to provide clear policies.

4. Shifts in Preferences and Branding:

Despite policy changes, the UK remains the second most preferred destination. Australia's reputation is at risk due to stricter immigration settings and visa rejections.

5. Factors Influencing Choices:

"Subject of interest" and "earning potential after graduation" are major influences on program choices, especially in China and the Philippines.

6. Work and Immigration Opportunities:

Students from Bangladesh and the Philippines prioritize destinations with job demand and favorable immigration policies.

7. Welcoming Environments and Career Opportunities:

Visa regulations and work opportunities are critical for international students when choosing destinations.




